MSLI's school lunch program is serving more meals than ever!

With seven primary schools and two preschools, MSLI's program served more school lunches than ever this year! Almost 2,000 students came to school each day, where they could rely on a hot, delicious lunch. Quality nutrition makes a big difference in keeping kids coming to school, and enabling them to learn.

MSLI's preschools are gaining momentum!

MSLI's latest initiative is our preschool program for 3- to 5-year-old children in Bombôfo and Duvane villages. MSLI started from scratch, building the preschools, hiring and training teachers, and enrolling students. Each preschool has a morning and an afternoon session in order to accommodate more students, with a total of around 200 students attending this year. But some students (especially the three-year-olds) show up in the morning and stay all the way to the end of the afternoon session (and the preschool teachers let them stay of course). Since the children are very young, between 3-5 years, they have a harder time eating a large amount in one meal and can't go as long in between meals. Given the importance of good nutrition for this critical stage of child development, the MSLI team decided that it was best to add a second meal for kids in the preschool program. With this program, we aim to address the critical nutritional and early childhood education needs that will help these kids be prepared for primary school.

Ensuring good nutrition during a child's younger years is essential for their growth. MSLI's lunches always include fresh, quality dishes, like kale peanut stew, fortified corn porridge (xima), and beets!

The preschool teachers, hired by MSLI, engage with the children, playing games, telling stories, and teaching basic literacy and numeracy. For most of these children, this early childhood education will help them be much better prepared once they get to first grade.

MSLI's farmer groups continue to grow

Farmers are a key part of MSLI's model. MSLI selects farmers who are living in poverty and our goal is for them to learn, grow, and be able to sell enough to rise out of poverty. By sourcing food from these farmer groups, we are increasing the impact of every dollar spent on school meals. We are also ensuring fresh, quality food for the school meals. Farmers can, and should, be a key part of the solution to ending hunger in Mozambique.
